OPERATIONS IN ITALY, MARCH 1944

The beginning of the month of March found "A" Company at 913213, "B" Company at 912215, and "C" Company at 920211, all forward positions where they were awaiting the order to attack up the Liri Valley. The first two weeks of weather during the month were wet and disagreeable. The Battalion Commander several times planned to move the Companies back to a rear area but due to the uncertainty of the situation they remained in forward positions.

One request was made to the Commanding General, Combat Command "B", to move companies but it was evidently not favorably considered because no reply was received.

The Battalion Commander and Staff checked the Companies on several different occasions and also spent a good deal of time perfecting plans for the forthcoming operation. Traffic Controls Fosts were checked and several Company Commander meetings were held to be sure that all orders and plans were fully understood.

On 14 March at approximately 1930, the Battalion was alerted by Liaison Officer from Combat Command "B", that the attack was to take place the following day. The field order was received and plans for the next days activities were made by the Battalion Commander and Staff.

At 0730 on 15 March, the Battalion Command Group began its movement to the forward Command Lost at Cervare. At 0845 all elements of the Command Group closed into the new command post. A message center was established and communications were immediately set up with our Companies and Traffic Control Headquarters. All officers who were to maintain Traffic Control Posts reported to the CF to be dispatched to their regular stations as they were called for.

From C835 to 1200 continuous flights of American Bombers bombed Cassino. Some bombs were dropped in the area occupied by our Company "C". One load of bombs was accidently dropped near Cervaro.

Friendly artillery began its concentration at noon. Companies "\" and "B" reported their missions complete at 1247. Company "C" reported that no targets of opportunity had been picked up consequently they expended no ammunition.

Orders were received from the 3-2, Corbet Johnand 434 shat all traffic out trol stations up to 1c. I would be manned by 1500. Forward control posts were to be submed as the situation progressed.

Japtain Kinnison, Lt Hauck, Lt Witten, and Lt Gould left the Corner 2 rost to man their assigned Traffic Control Posts.

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The Battalion Commander and 3-6 left the 3 to occupy Praffic Doutrol Haadquerters. This at the Haadquerters that the Haadquerters the John the Haadquerters of the Januarder contected Hajor Jankins, the Haw Jaaland Provide Arthal, and personally inspected all traffic control mosts on Highway 6.

At 1709 it was reported that the Indians were on the fill west of fill 193.

At 1825 a message was received from our Liaison Officer that tanks were 75 yards from objective Quisling. Forther advance was impossible without engineer aid. Hand to hand fighting and small arms fighting was taking place in Cassino and on Lerbecassino.


Combat Command "3" called indermittently during the night to give the situation and to keep us posted on any forward movements. Officers cauring control mosts stayed on duty throughout the night. Their mositions were shelled intermittently during the night. During the day to Battalion expended 744 rounds of H.S. on observed targets.

At 0541, 16 arch, Combat Commany "3" called and said that the bridge on Highway 6 had been finished and that certain reconnaissance elements had gone across.

The Battalion Commander and 3-3 point most of the day at Traffic Control Headquarters keeping up with the situation. Traffic Control rosts were relieved and re-manned to give the officers needed rest.

At 1000, a flight of 3-25 American Bombers dropped bombs in Company "G"'s area. One man was injured, Sgt James T. Boyd, 38060607, one k-10 was damaged to the extent that it had to be evacuated. The tank was evacuated during darkness and a replacement sent in the following day. During the day Co "3" expended 21 rounds of H.E.

The Battalion Commander and S-3 spent most of the day, 17 March 1944 at Traffic Control Headquarters. From this point in the early afternoon they directed "A" and "3" Commanies fire on an enemy nebelwerfer.



At 1700 the Battalion Commander and 3-3 returned to the Inttalion Command Post. Traffic Control Posts on Lighway 6 ware subjected to intermittent shell fire during the day.

At 1715 the Commany Commanders renerted to the Command lost where the Battalion Commander ordered that the Commany Commanders should should end time with the gunners. He stresped that Commany Commanders should emphasize the closing of sheafs.

Before the Commanders returned to their Joneanies an enemy artillery shell struck the Command Post. Javeral others were close-in. No one was injured.

The Liaison Officer to Combat Command "3" renorted that four Sriendly tanks had gone to Cassino. Their approach to Cassino was observed by all Battalian OP's. Two are witnessed burning from the Cattalian Command Post by the American Cofficer. To exact reports were to be had concerning the situation. The Sattalian expended 1,631 rounds of E.E. and 48 rounds of smoke on observed targets during the day.

The following morning the Battalier Commander and S-3 took station at the Traffic Control headquarters. Traffic Control Posts were mained all during 18 March by our officers. The Battalien Commander and S-3 remained at Traffic Control Meadquarters throughout the day and on different operations fired the commanies on observed targets. The Commany Commanders were called to Traffic Control Meadquarters to observe the fires of their Commanies and to make adjustment whenever necessary. Intermittent shell fire fell all along Mighway 6 during the day. Cantain Minnison, manning Traffic Control Post #3, was subjected to heavy artillary concentrations.

At 0906 hours enemy aircraft dive-bombed friendly frontline positions. The lat Armored Group forward Command lost suffered cosmulties from the bombing in both human lives and material destroyed. The lattelien Commander observing the bombing of the group headquarters from his cost some 400 yards away made arrangements with the Commanies to rovide transportation to evacuate the lst Armored Group personnel to the rear for reorganization.

Several enemy air raids took place during the day. The enemy places usually strafed Highway 6 in the vicinity of Traffic Control Post all located at the Cervaro and Highway 6. Sgt Hipskind, Tec 5 Novelli, and Pvt 1 cl Helms, manning two .50 Caliber machine guns on the Battalion Commanders and S-3 vehicles, stuck to their posts and fired on all enemy planes despite their strafing and bombing.

The Battalion silenced enemy nebelwerfers and destroyed one enemy S.P. run by direct fire from Company "C". During this action the Battalion onconded 705 rounds of H. I. and SS rounds of smoke.

The following morning the 3-3 called Combat Journan. "B" to obtain information on the situation. The only information received was that the energy had counter-attacked on Hill 193 but no results as to their success and been received. The Battalion Commander, 3-3, and 3-2 studied recent 3-2 reports and maps for possible targets.

The Battalion Commander and 5-3 heat the 3 for Franfic Control Healdwarters. In the aftermoon the Commany Johnson Her were called to Traffic Control Headquarters to witness firing of their Companies.

Several enemy air raids took place during the way, 19 Morch. There was much bombing and straffing of Highway 6 in the vicinity of Traffic Comprol meadquarters. Our .50 Cal. machine guns were fired at enemy planes that were within range during the day.

At the end of the day 10 wards, the enemy held Hill 165 and our forces were still holding Hill 193.

The Battalion Commander and 3-2 left for Traffic Control Headquarters. There they were called to Headquarters, 5th New Z aland Amored Brighter where they conferred with the Commander, Brighdian Burrows asked Lt Colonel Pyland if it would be noscible for the Battalian to lay fire callely within 200 yards of Friendly Grooms. It Colonel Pyland, the Battalian Commander, stated that we could do so as the Battalian was registered on a building very year the spot on which fire was wanted.

At 1317 hours Combat Comma 1 134 2 2750 Min Bath Lion Commander and told him that he was to send four L-10's into Cascino to knock down some buildings and trive enemy tanks out. The Battelion Commander and S-3 ciscussed with General Allen the feasibility of this plan. The Battalion Commander, It Colonel Hyland, stated that it was a ainst all principles of Fank Destroyer tactics to use h-10's in this manner. He did state however that from the Battalion's present positions he believed the job could be done. It Jolonel yland was ordered to contact General Parkinson, New Sealand Division Commander, for instructions. General Carkinson or ered Lt Colonel Pyland to make arrangements with Brigadier Burrows of the 5th New Waland Brigade for our M-10's to go into Cassino to perform this mission. Lt Colonel Pyland and the 3-3 drove to the 5th New Zealand Brigade Headquarters and conferred with Brigadier Burrows. Combot Command "3" called later in the evening to tell us the plan had been discarded and that we were removed from alart status until 1800 hours. 37 . arch.

During the day, 24 arch enemy artillery was active, harassing both forward and rear areas. No firing was done by the destroyer companies.

Our Lisiaon Officer reported from Combat Command "B" in the evening hours of 24 Larch that the Battalion would move back to the vicinity of Jampagliano. The Battalion Commander decided that it would be best to move to the vicinity of Piccilli in order to reorganize and get all elements of the Battalion together. Permission was given by Combat Command "3" to make this move. All Commanies were alerted to the fact that they would move at daylight, 25 march.

Reconnaissance Commany furnished personnel for AA crews from 20 Larch to 24 arch inclusive. During this time 450 rounds of .50 Cal. ammunition was expended.

Lovement began at daylight with Company "3" moving out first. "8", "A", Reconnaissance Company, and the Battalion Command Fost moved in that order. The Dattalion closed in at the Educilli area at 1230 hours. At 1545 hours our Liaison Officer to Combat Command "B" reported in and stated that affective 1500, 25 March, we were detached from Combat Command "B" and would revert to control of our parent organization, the 36th Infantry Division.



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

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
