GENERAL ORDERS

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SECTION I — POSTHUMOUS AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Silver Star is posthumously awarded to the following named individual for gallantry in action.

EARL PHILIP J. VASCHAK, 37704672, Private First Class, Company A, 14th Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 17 August 1944 in France. While his platoon was guarding the left flank of a road block to prevent the enemy from destroying an important bridge, Private First Class Vaschak occupied an outpost position. When a company of enemy troops, in attempting to reach the bridge, attacked the road block, Private First Class Vaschak leapt from his fighting hole and braved heavy small arms fire as he advanced on an enemy automatic rifle position. He moved over 60 yards of exposed terrain, firing his rifle as he ran, and succeeded in killing the automatic rifleman. With harassing fire from that hostile weapon eliminated, the platoon was able to maneuver into a draw and there force the enemy to surrender. Private First Class Vaschak was later killed by an enemy hand grenade. Next of kin: Mrs. E. J. Vaschak (Wife), 119 South Jackson Street, Denver, Colorado.

SECTION II — AWARD OF SILVER STAR, PRISONER OF WAR

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Silver Star is awarded to the following named individual, a prisoner of war, for gallantry in action.

JOHN J. BEATY, 36035764, Staff Sergeant, Headquarters & Service Company, 111th Engineer Combat Battalion, for gallantry in action on 25 August 1944 in France. When a numerically superior enemy attacked a recently captured town, friendly troops were forced to withdraw and establish better defensive positions on the outskirts. After Sergeant Beatty had left the village, he discovered that five men had remained behind to man and protect a .50 caliber machine gun, covering the withdrawal of their comrades. Aware that they would soon be over-powered by the surging enemy forces, he determined to assist them in effecting their own withdrawal and immediately began the hazardous return trip to the town. With thoughts only for the safety of his comrades, he crawled forward under small arms fire, over terrain where cover and concealment were negligible. When he reached the town, the nosy troops had arrived and he was completely surrounded by enemy foot soldiers and tanks. From this engagement Sergeant Beatty was reported a prisoner of war. 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SECTION III — AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Silver Star is awarded to each of the following named individuals, for gallantry in action.

CHARLES S. RUDD, JR., 0534008, First Lieutenant, 93d Armored Field Artillery Battalion, for gallantry in action on 25 August 1944 in France. When Lieutenant Rudd, liaison pilot and observer, was informed that a column of enemy tanks and personnel carriers was advancing toward the rear of the 36th Infantry Division, he immediately took off from the airfield and flew over the head of the column. Adjusting fire on the leading tanks, he succeeded in dispersing the entire force, driving it from the road. Although antiaircraft guns opened fire on him, he again adjusting fire on each vehicle, destroying one tank and a half-truck personnel carrier and disabling two other tanks. During this action, which lasted two hours, Lieutenant Rudd was the only observer engaging this column, and no friendly forces were in contact with it at the time. Displaying unusual skill and courage, he flew back into the cone of antiaircraft fire time after time, wreaking heavy damage on the enemy forces. Entered the Service from Kansas City, Missouri.

FRANCIS D. CROWE, 35791574, Staff Sergeant, Company A, 112d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 15 August 1944 in France. Sergeant Crowe was guide for the leading platoon in the battalion's advance against one of the first towns encountered in the invasion of Southern France. As the platoon advanced cautiously down a narrow street under cover of darkness, the sound of an approaching enemy tank halted the column and the order to take cover was given. The tank directed sweeping machine gun fire straight down the street, and a squad of enemy infantrymen following the tank began hurling hand grenades. While his comrades sought cover from the heavy fire, Sergeant Crowe, aware that the company commander and platoon leader were already wounded and the entire company threatened, seized a bazooka and advanced 50 yards in the face of point blank antitank and machine gun fire to a position 20 yards from the tank. He scored two direct hits on the tank, setting it on fire and killing the driver. He then assisted his platoon sergeant in evacuating the men from the area in which the blazing tank would explode. Entered the Service from Lewisburg, Ohio.

EARL G. WRIGHT, 38036410, Private First Class, Company E, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 18 August 1944 in France. Private First Class Wright was advancing with the leading platoon of his company when he and his comrades encountered heavy fire from an enemy force occupying a well-intrenched dugout. He moved cautiously toward the enemy emplacements and silenced a machine pistol which was covering the position. Then, contemptuous of personal danger, he jumped into the dugout with his bayonet fixed and subdued eight enemy soldiers who had delayed the advance of his company. Because of his daring, yet the organization was able to move forward and continue its attack. Entered the Service from Dallas, Texas.

SECTION IV — SELECTED AWARD OF SILVER STAR

(H) In much of Section II, General Orders Number 40, as, this Headquarters, it awards a Silver Star to LEONARD H. ROUGHFALLI, 37616041, Private, Company L, 142d Infantry Regiment, is rescinded, and the following substituted therefor:

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Silver star is awarded to the following named individual for gallantry in action.

"GEO. F. DAUGHERTY, 37616042, Private, Company L, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 5 June 1944 in Italy. Private Daugherty was automatic rifleman with 1st Platoon, Company L, as it moved by motor convoy toward a strategic city. An enemy force attacked and engaged the platoon in a fire fight. From his covered position, Private Daugherty saw an enemy machine gun crew going into action. Realizing the gravity of this threat and the casualties it could cause, he left his place of safety and advanced headlong into the open gun fire, answering with deadly blasts from his automatic rifle. By his courageous action he destroyed the gun crew and materially aided his platoon to defeat the enemy, killing twelve, wounding thirteen and capturing fifteen. Entered the Service from St. Louis, Missouri."

SECTION V -- AWARD OF PURPLE HEART

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Purple Heart is awarded to each of the following named individuals of the 131st Field Artillery Battalion, for wounds received as a result of enemy action in Italy.

ELIAS J. GAMBINO, 01178304, Second Lieutenant, 16 June 1944. Entered the Service from East Boston, Massachusetts.

LEON L. SMITH, 34238527, Technician Fifth Grade, Headquarters & Service Company, 131st Field Artillery Battalion, 21 January 1944. Entered the Service from Jonesboro, Tennessee.
