SECTION IV - COLMENDATION FOR EXCEPTIONALLY MERITORIOUS CONDUCT

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-55, each of the following named individuals is commended for exceptionally meritorious conduct:

LESLIE A. WOLFF, 20803605, First Sergeant, Company L, 141st Infantry Regiment, for exceptionally meritorious conduct on 1 June 1944 in Italy. When the left flank of Company L was threatened by a furious enemy counterattack, Sergeant Wolff was sent to guide two squads from the reserve platoon to the company command post. He moved over terrain swept by continuous, rapid machine gun and sniper fire, but he succeeded in reaching his objective and leading the two squads safely back to the command post. He then volunteered to move the squads into position on the left flank in order to supplement the unit's resistance to the enemy attack. He again led the men through hostile small arms fire and skillfully directed them to positions affording excellent fields of fire against the enemy. Entered the Service from bioulton, Texas.

In spite of intense sniper fire all around the building, to fearlessly maintained their exposed position and continued inflicting casualties on the attackers, firing steadily and accurately, until they were ordered to withdraw with their squad to alternate positions.

CHARLES DEAN, 31322115, Frivate First Class, Company D, 141st Infantry Regiment, for exceptionally meritorious conduct on 30 May 1944 in Italy. During a rurious enemy tank attack, Private First Class Dean, gunner in a machine gun squad supporting a platbon of Company C, fired rapidly in the face of the charging tanks forcing them to button up with his accurate fire. While he was engaging the leading tank, soldiers from the second tank crept near his position and hurled hand grenades at his emplacement. Heedless of personal safety, he remained with his weapon and continued firing until the enemy was forced to withdraw. Entered the Service from Waterville, Maine.

AUSTIN C. KITCHENS, 32995212, Private, Company L. 141st Infantry Regiment, for exceptionally meritorious conduct on 1 June 1944 in Italy. As he moved forward, he spotted the three mortarmen fleeing toward their vehicles. Acting swittly, he cpened fire on the hostile soldiers and succeeded in killing one, wounding another. and capturing the third. The trip to the beachhead was made on landing craft and was ofte subjected to combing and strafing attacks from enemy aircraft. Upon reaching a point of debarkation, they drove their vehicles to crious dumps under almost continuous artillery shelling and unloaded the ammunition themselves. Although completely unfamiliar with the area, they delivered the supplies speedily and . efficiently. On one occasion they drove to the front lines to evacuate a group of paratroopers from positions rendered untenable by the heavy artillery and mortar shelling. During this period they made four trips to the beachhead, always performing their duties with exemplary calmness and dispatch.
